
Down by the Riverside*A traditional gospel song about the importance of faith and community.*




Michael Row the Boat Ashore A lively sea shanty about a group of sailors rowing their boat back to shore.

The House of the Rising Sun A traditional folk ballad about a young man who loses everything, including his love, his family, and his home.




Will the Circle Be Unbroken A moving hymn-like folk song about the circle of life and the power of faith.

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
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
