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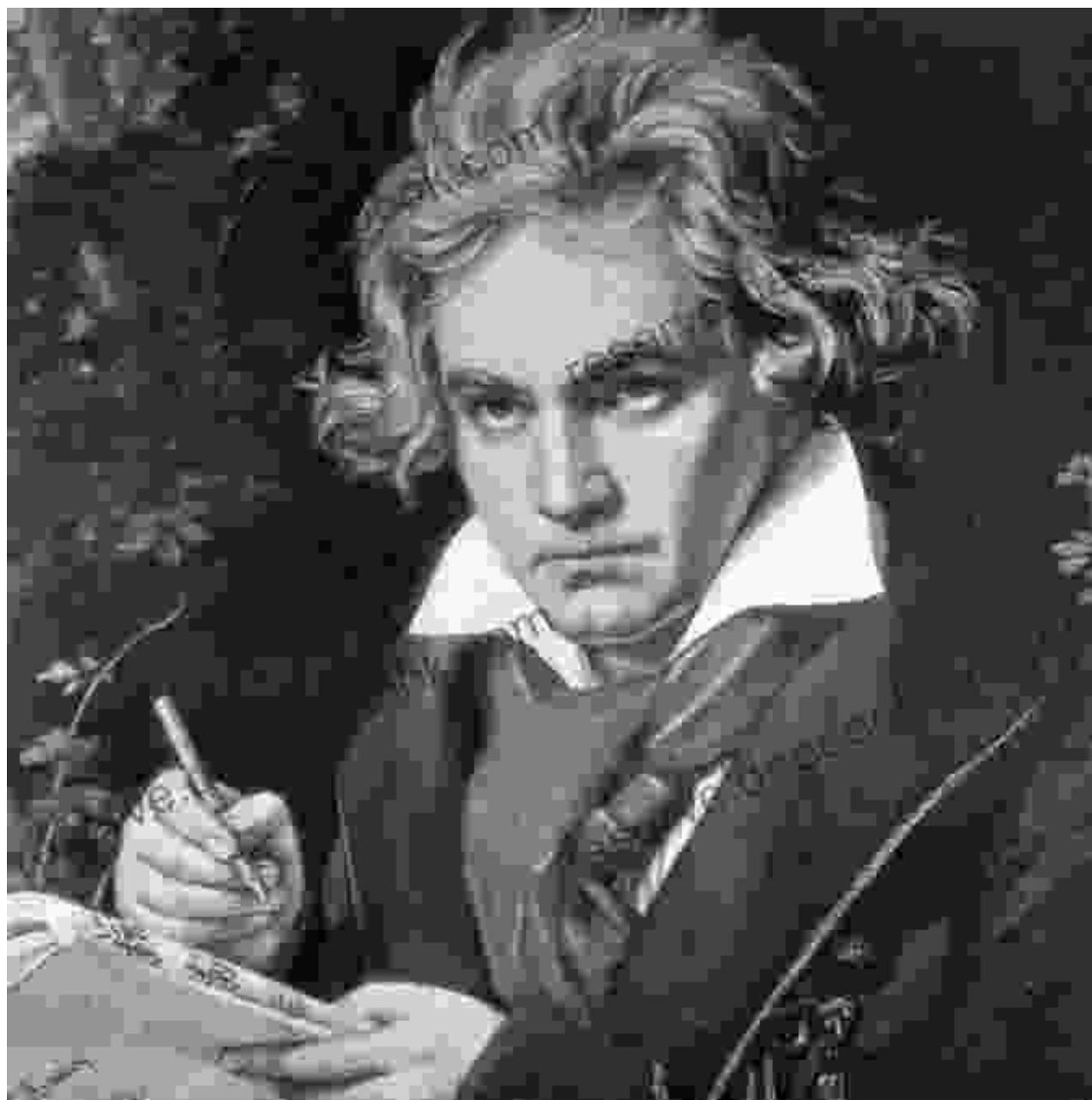
Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750)

Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)



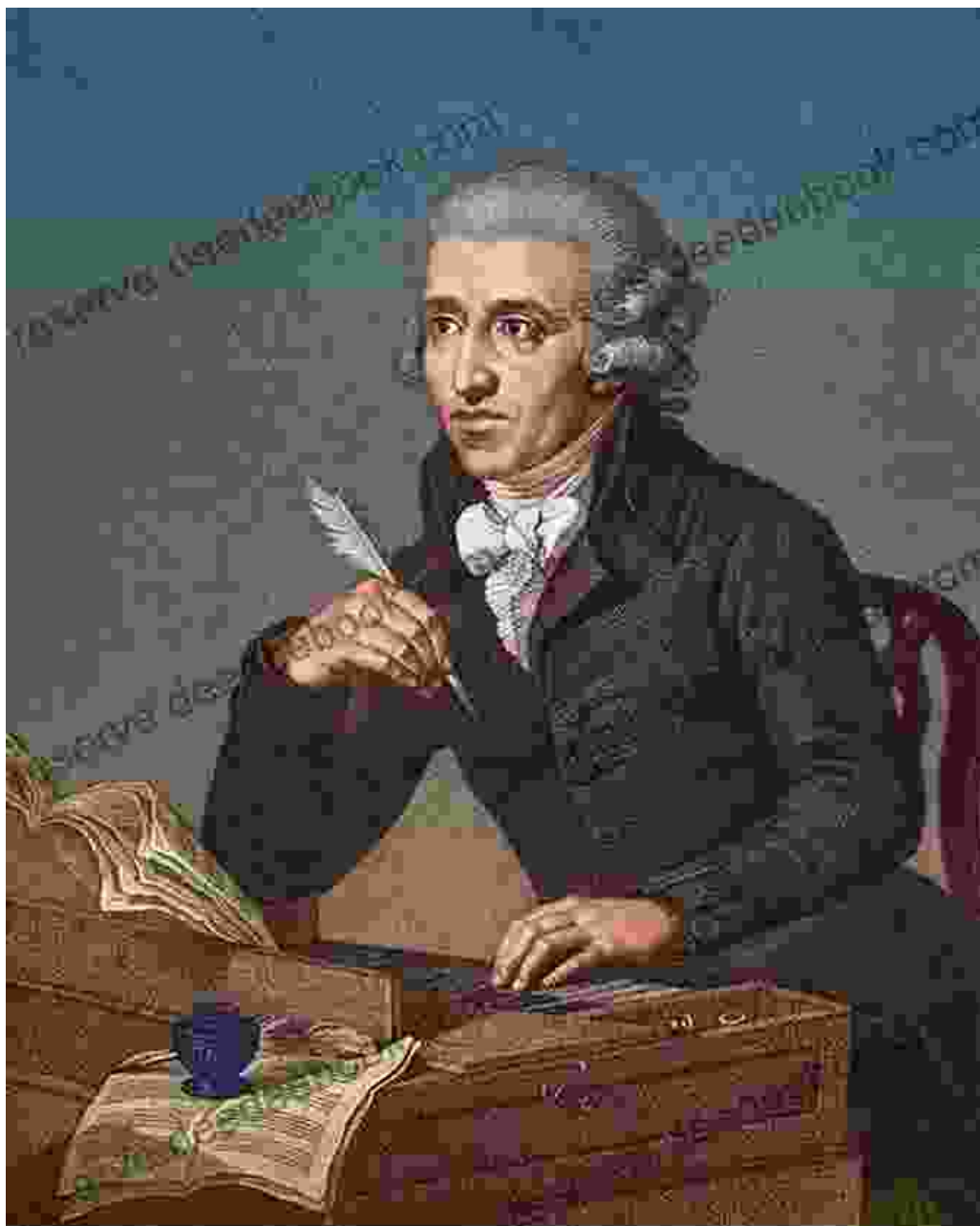

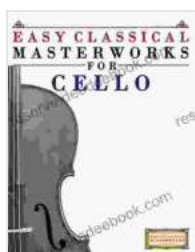
Antonio Vivaldi (1678-1741)

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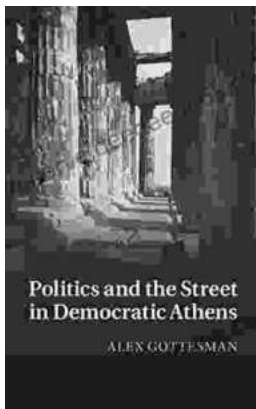
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
