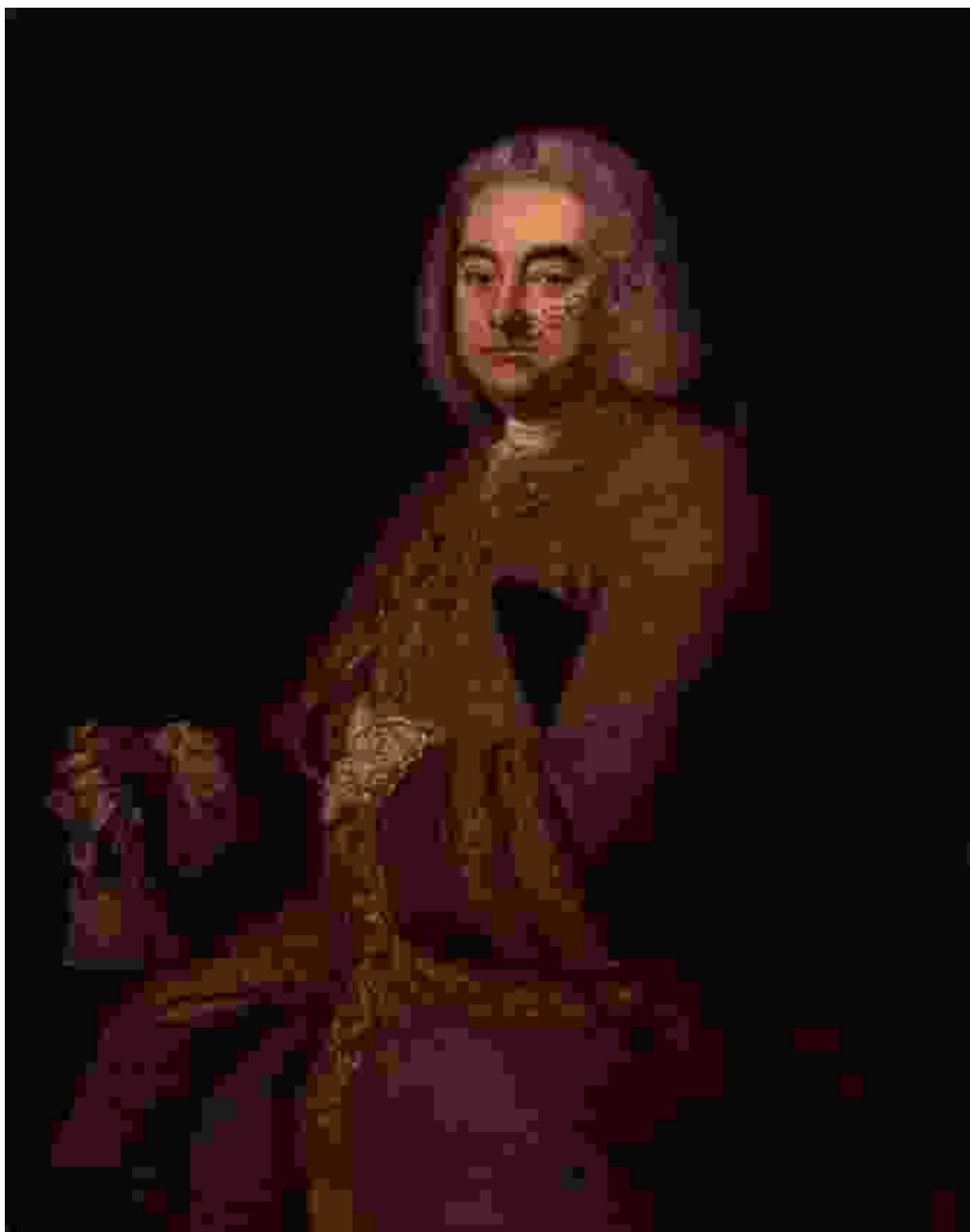
Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

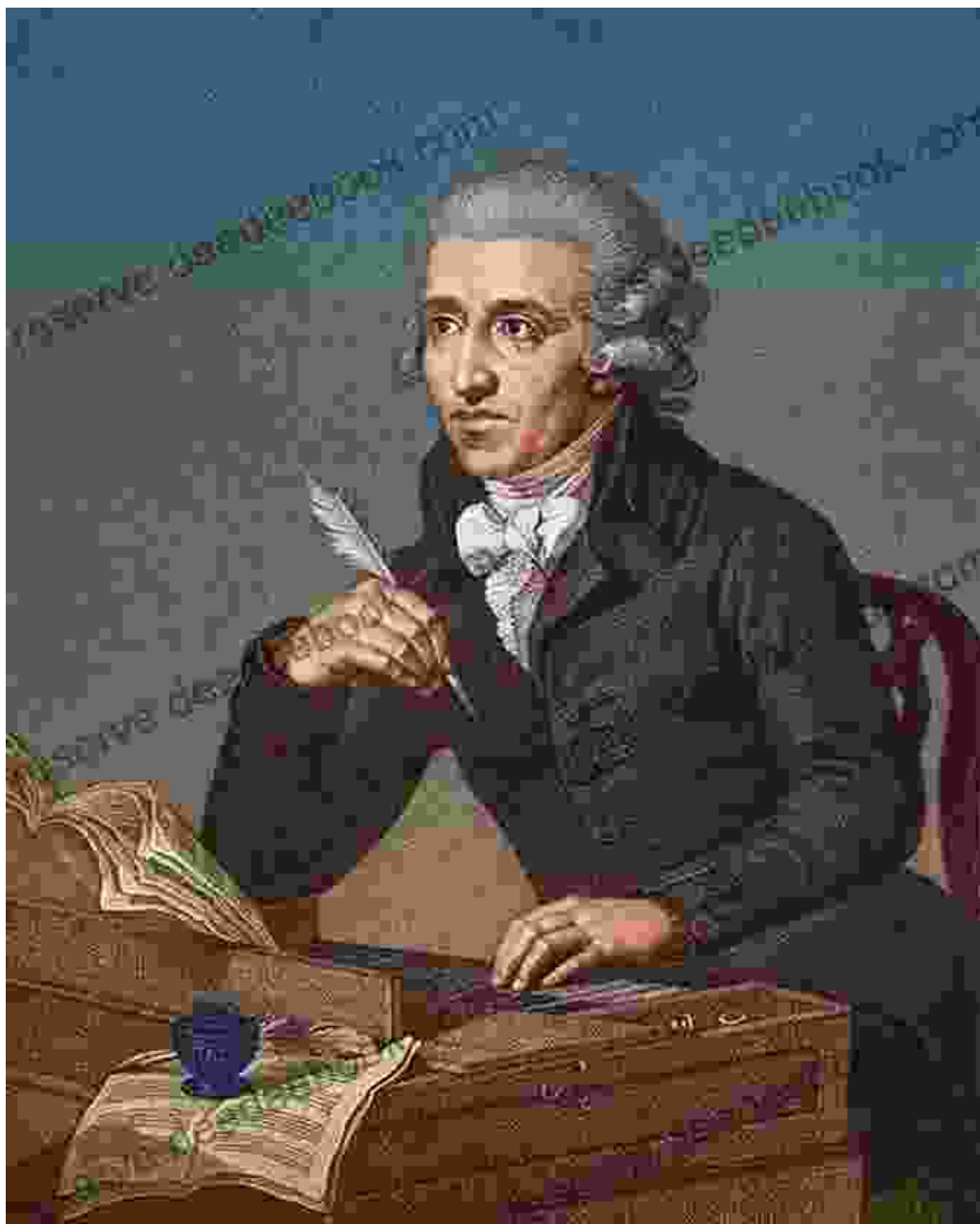

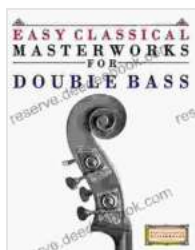
